### **SCHOLARSHIP**

The Scholarship Committee met on June 10, 2016. 24 complete applications were received and reviewed. The committee had difficult decisions to make this year as they had 13 candidates with prior degree: seven with Bachelor Degrees in everything from Kinesiology to Fine Arts and six with Associate Degrees. They had five applicants with active military service, two of them in the new Navy Nurse Candidate Program. There were also five applicants with an immediate family member who has served, including one applicant whose mother is a retired Navy Nurse. The applicants came from nine different colleges or universities.

The committee ended up awarding two- \$2000 scholarships and two-\$1000 scholarships, a total of four scholarships.

**Natasha Kelly** (\$2000) - is currently a CNA working part time at Rady Children's Hospital. She has a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts and has been a stage manager for the Old Globe and North Coast Repertory Theater. She is in the Navy Nurse Candidate Program which pays a stipend, but she provides financial assistance to her parents in addition to paying for school (CSU San Marcos, GPA 3.9). She wants to be a Navy Nurse because "those that volunteer to suffer to protect their community are those that deserve the best care."

**Brandon Trujeque** (\$2000) - is the first in his family to attend college. He started college and decided to join the US Army Reserves as a way of financing his education. He completed his degree (BS in Biology) and chose to go on active duty to earn the educational benefits he would need to continue his education. Those benefits allowed him to complete his nursing school pre-requisites, and now needs assistance to complete his BSN. Once he has his BSN, he intends to join one of the branches of the military in a reserve status. He attends CSU Los Angeles and has a 3.8 GPA.

**Madeleine Quackenbush** (\$1000) - is in the Navy Nurse Candidate Program and hopes to one day be deployed to a trauma hospital or serve on one of the hospital ships. Her family provided some financial assistance her first two years but she now has siblings in college and she must be self-sufficient for her final year of school. She attends CSU Channel Islands and has a 3.8 GPA.

**Christopher Nalick** (\$1000) - has an AA degree and works part time as a patient care assistant at Scripps Memorial. It was during his work as a firefighter and then a paramedic that he realized he wanted to be deeper in the medical system and started taking pre-nursing classes. He will graduate in December and hopes to work in the VA or UCSD, ultimately working in cardiac intensive care. He attends CSU San Marcos and has a GPA of 3.9).

## VETERAN COMMUNITY OUTREACH



At our July luncheon at Talega, we were excited to have **Scott Youngren**, construction manager and owner of Youngren Construction, as our guest speaker for Homes for our Troops (HFOT). Scott gave a wonderful presentation and shared insights with the group on how he became involved with HFOT and why he stays involved. His wife also attended and shared her heartfelt gratitude about the program. It was evident that her support for what Scott is doing with HFOT is of utmost importance to her as well. Scott explained how various properties are located, how he works on the specifications of the house with the recipient member and his or her family, and how he tailors the house to fit the unique needs of each member. His workers and staff are equally invested in what they are doing and many of them volunteer their time to attend the Saturday planting days as well as the key ceremony when the veteran receives his or her house key.

Great idea to have Scott speak. We will be honored in October to have Marine Corps **Sgt Toran Gaal and his wife Lisa** as our guests. A story on our San Diego NBC news one evening last February was my introduction to Homes for our Troops (HFOT). It featured the ground breaking ceremony in Valley Center for the Gaal's new adaptive home that Youngren Construction was building for HFOT. That was how we began our year-long focus on fund raising for them!

Toran lost both of his legs, his left one was amputated at the hip, in Afghanistan in June 2011. He also suffered severe TBI. Following treatment at Bethesda and the VA in Palo Alto, he was sent to Naval Medical Center San Diego and was eventually medically retired. During the summer of 2015 Toran hand cycled across the country to raise money for the Semper Fi Fund as well as increase awareness about fellow injured vets. Today Toran spends a great deal of his time as a motivational speaker, coaches youth league basketball and also works with young Marines. His wife, Lisa recently published "*After*", an intense and insightful book based on her interviews with eight young men who sustained life-altering injuries. 100% of her book sales will benefit Warrior Foundation - Freedom Station.

Their home is the 221st built by HFOT. All of the \$4165.00 you donated at the April and July luncheons, when we "Passed the Hat" and held

our opportunity drawings, was used toward the landscaping at the Gaal home. All of the monies we raise in October will also be allocated to that as well.

### **ORAL HISTORY PROJECT**

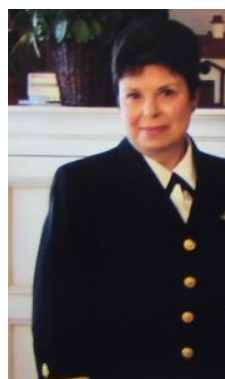

## USNS MERCY



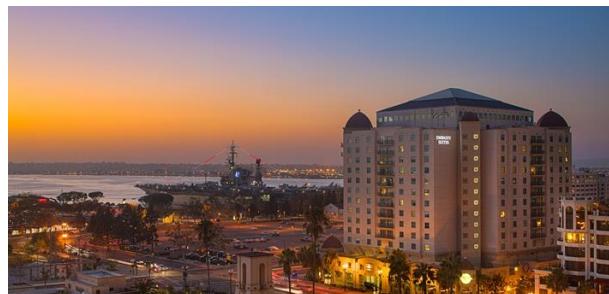
The USNS MERCY (T-AH 19) and its crew recently completed an annual humanitarian assistance mission as part of Pacific Partnership 2016. Pacific Partnership is in its 11<sup>th</sup> iteration and is the largest annual multilateral humanitarian assistance and disaster relief preparedness mission conducted in the Indo-Asia-Pacific region.

The 894-foot ship, when deployed, carries up to 1,215 medical personnel and provides full hospital capabilities and services including surgery, radiology, optometry, dermatology, physical therapy, dialysis and dental and has a pharmacy and blood bank.

### MILLION VETERAN PROGRAM

The Department of Veterans Affairs' Million Veteran Program (MVP) is a national, voluntary research program. With an expected enrollment of one million veterans over the next five to seven years, MVP is designed to help researchers better understand how genes affect health and illness, with the goal of improving health care for veterans. Any veteran receiving care in the VA health care system can participate. Participation takes about 20 minutes. For your convenience, MVP study visits may be scheduled on the same day as other VA appointments. ## Secretary Mabus Names Destroyer after Pioneering U.S. Navy Nurse

ARLINGTON, Va. (NNS) –

During a ceremony to honor women who served in the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps, Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus announced an Arleigh-Burke class destroyer, DDG 123, will be named Lenah H. Sutcliffe Higbee. Higbee, the future ship's namesake, was a pioneering United States Navy chief nurse, who served as the Superintendent of the U.S. Navy Nurse Corps during World War I and was the first female recipient of the Navy Cross.

"It is a great honor to name this ship in recognition of Lenah H. Sutcliffe Higbee," said Mabus. "I have no doubt that all who serve aboard her will carry on the legacy of service and commitment exemplified by this pioneer of U.S. Navy Nurse Corps."

The former USS Higbee (DD-806), commissioned in 1945, was the first ship named in her honor and the first U.S. Navy combat ship to bear the name of a female member of the Naval service.

Mabus honored the service and sacrifice of women who served in the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps during a sunset parade on the U.S. Marine Corps Iwo Jima Memorial grounds.

Mabus stated: "This ship will be a part of our fleet for decades, and the legacy of Lenah Sutcliffe Higbee and her service to our nation will live on for decades through the ship's voyages across the oceans, and through the lives of the crew who will sail aboard it."

"Higbee's professionalism, leadership and selfless dedication to her nurses and patients reflect the highest standards of naval service," said Dr. Regina T. Akers, naval historian. "She and her nurses provided the best treatment possible often under some of the worse conditions. Higbee will continue to inspire all who learn of her courage, honor and commitment."

Arleigh-Burke class destroyers conduct a variety of operations from peacetime presence and crisis response to sea control and power projection. DDG 123 will be capable of fighting air, surface and subsurface battles simultaneously and will contain a combination of offensive and defensive weapon systems designed to support maritime warfare, including integrated air and missile defense and vertical launch capabilities.

The ship will be constructed at Ingalls Shipbuilding, a division of Huntington Ingalls Industries, in Mississippi and is expected to enter the Navy fleet in 2024. The ship will be 509-feet-long, have a beam length of 59 feet and be capable of operating at speeds in excess of 30 knots.
