2022 NNCA Service Award

The **NNCA Service Award** was established to provide recognition to any member for continuing significant service resulting in the betterment of the NNCA. A special pin designed by Bailey, Banks and Biddle is presented to the selectee.

Henrietta 'Hank' Wildeboer was one of the founders of the Palmetto Chapter of the Navy Nurse Corps Association established 28 years ago on July 17, 1991. Along with six other members, she drafted a constitution, and wrote and adopted the chapter bylaws. She was instrumental in the planning and work to make this chapter viable, with its first membership meeting held on October 30, 1991. At the national level, Hank is an active member and helped to plan and organize the NNCA 2000 Bi-Annual Membership Meeting in Charleston, South Carolina.

Hank served as PCNNCA Treasurer and has been an active member in each of its past 28 years. She designed the final approved

PCNNCA logo and ensures PCNNCA members are recognized for their military service, nominating Doris Pierce as a speaker for a Panel Discussion, "Angels of the Battlefield: The Unsung Heroes," at a celebration on the USS Yorktown honoring Vietnam Veterans.

Hank has organized and participated in the Charleston Veteran's Day Parade since 2015. At every chapter meeting she collects toiletries and sundries for the local Veteran's Administration facilities.

Hank also contributes to the local community as an active volunteer at the Patriot Point Naval Maritime Museum and Medal of Honor Museum on the USS Yorktown, CV-10. She greets visitors to the museums, provides information and directions and answers visitor's questions. She also volunteers as an usher at the Dock Street Theater and the Queen Street Theater.

Hank has served PCNNCA for over twenty-eight years and is so deserving of recognition with the NNCA Service Award for her continuous contribution to the Navy Nurse Corps legacy at the local and national levels.

IN MEMORIAM

Virginia Lee Pritchard, CDR Navy Nurse Corp, Ret., age 85, died February 9, 2022 in Mount Pleasant, SC. Her interment with military funeral honors was held on February 21, 2022 at the Mount Pleasant Memorial Gardens Columbarium.

Known as Ginny to her friends and family, Virginia Pritchard was born on July 23, 1936 in New York City. Virginia grew up in a U.S. Army military family. After four years of college, earning a BS in English in 1958, she graduated with the Class of 1961 from Columbia University Presbyterian Hospital Department of Nursing. She then

joined the Navy and served for 25 years as a surgical nurse, with supervising and teaching positions in four naval hospitals. Her assignments included bases in Japan and Guam as well as within the US.

In 1986, Virginia retired to Mount Pleasant and became active in civic, charitable, and social activities while preserving her connection with the Navy as a member of the Palmetto Chapter, Navy Nurse Corps Association where she held several board positions.





In her civilian career, Virginia became certified as a paralegal and served twelve years as a guardian ad litem for Charleston County Family Court, representing the best interests of child clients. For many years, she volunteered at the clinic of the Center for Birds of Prey in Awendaw. In addition, she enjoyed English change bell ringing and assisted as an elementary school teacher aide for remedial reading.

Over her long life, besides the US, Virginia lived in three foreign countries, and as an avid traveler, she visited twenty more, gathering an extensive collection of fine objets d'art.

Virginia is survived by her sister, Diane Reichard and her husband Harry; a

nephew, Eric Reichard and his wife, Susan, and his son, Kyle Reichard; and a niece, Elisabeth Swanbery and her husband, Adam, and Elisabeth's

Captain Mary Jo Leonard Young, 86, of Summerville, passed away on Saturday, June 18, 2022. Her family received friends prior to the Mass of Christian Burial June 25, 2022, at St. John The Beloved Catholic Church, Summerville, SC. The Rite of Committal will follow in Arlington National Cemetery at a later date.

Mary Jo was born in Jacksonville, Florida, on April 3, 1936. She was the daughter of Joseph and Grace Leonard. Mary Jo graduated from St. Rose High School and St. Rita's School of Nursing in Lima,

Ohio. In 1958, she joined the Navy Nurse Corps. While in the Navy, she received her BS degree in nursing from the University of Colorado and a Master's Degree in higher education from George Washington University. She retired from the Navy in 1984as the Director of Nursing at the Charleston Navy Hospital.

Mary Jo was a founding member of the Palmetto Chapter of the Navy Nurse Corps Association (PCNNCA) and its first president. She was chairman of the 2000 NNCA reunion in Charleston and a long-term chairman of the NNCA Nominating Committee.

As a member of St. John the Beloved Catholic Church, she served in many ministries of the church. Mary Jo was involved in many community volunteer activities since her retirement including Middleton Place Foundation, Historic Charleston Foundation, Charleston Symphony league, Friends of the Dock Street, Volunteer Service Unit of the Coastal Center, Spoleto and Piccolo Festival, President of Flowertown Seniors and long-time leader of Summerville TOPS.

She is survived by her sister-in-law, Lois Leonard (John); cousin, Marilyn DePalma, cousin, Shelley Johnson (Paul), and their daughters, Kelsey (Luke) and Hailey, who lovingly referred to her as Nana; her dog, Gracie, and many loving and wonderful friends. She was preceded in death by her parents and her brothers, Jack, Jerry and Mike Leonard.

Taylor Irving Cook of Mount Pleasant, South Carolina, a physician who spent 30 years in the Navy Medical Corps, died peacefully on Monday, March 7, 2022, after a long illness, with his wife of 47 years, Patricia Ann Cook, at his side.

Dr. Cook was born March 4, 1937, in Providence, Rhode Forest Cook and Dorothy Gladys Taylor Cook. He earned

Island, and was the eldest son of Byron Forest Cook and Dorothy Gladys Taylor Cook. He earned a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Rhode Island and an MD from the University of Vermont. Following graduation from medical school in 1965, he completed his internship at National Navy Medical Center in Bethesda, Maryland. He then served two tours of duty as a Navy Flight Surgeon during the Vietnam War from 1966 to 1968 aboard the USS Coral Sea and the USS Ranger. Upon his return, he completed a general surgery residency and critical care fellowship at Naval Hospital, San Diego, California. From 1972 to 1984, he served in multiple roles in the Navy including as an attending surgeon at Naval Hospital, Long Beach, California; Medical Director of the Third Marine Air Wing in El Toro, California; Senior Flight Surgeon on the USS Franklin D. Roosevelt; Chief of Surgery at Naval Hospital, Jacksonville, Florida; and Executive Officer of Naval Hospital, Oakland, California. From 1984 to 1986, he was the Commanding Officer of Naval Hospital, Charleston, South Carolina, a role that he considered one of the highlights of his career. He served in Operation Desert Storm, where he led in-theater Navy medical support, from 1990 to 1991. Upon his return, he led a demonstration project for the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS), which later became Tricare for Life. Following his retirement as a Captain, Navy Medical Corps, in 1992, he served as the Medical Director for government programs at Blue Cross Blue Shield of South Carolina until his retirement in 2004.

He was an avid yachtsman and a lover of dogs. While he remained a staunch New Englander, he had great fondness for the Lowcountry and was happy to make his home in the Charleston area for close to 40 years.

He is an inspiration to his family for his dedicated service to his country, his care and compassion for his patients, and his efforts to increase access to and quality of healthcare for both active-duty military personnel and veterans. He was a wonderful husband, father and grandfather and will be immeasurably missed.

In addition to his wife, Patricia, Dr. Cook is survived by his son Sprague Cook and daughter-in-law Gabriella Cook; his son Christian Cook and daughter-in-law Kristina Cook; his daughter Allison Cook Reaves and son-in-law Avery Reaves; and his grandchildren Angelica Cook, Alexander Cook, Rebecca Cook, Christian Cook and Annabelle Reaves. He is predeceased by his parents and his brother, Lewis Byron Cook.

His funeral service was held on Friday, March 18 at Grace Church Cathedral in Charleston. Entombment with military honors will be at the Grace Church Cathedral Columbarium. Arrangements by J. Henry Stuhr, Inc., Downtown Chapel.

NURSES HONOR GUARD OF SOUTH CAROLINA LOOKING FOR MORE RECRUITS TO JOIN THE RANKS

"The nurses honor guard is a very special tribute to anybody in the nursing field," said Cox. "Nursing was my mom's calling and it became me and my sister's calling as well."

When twin sisters and nurses Windy Hucks and Cindy Cox lost their mother Claudine Robertson in December 2021, they wondered how they could honor her 30-plusyear nursing career at her funeral service.

The two found the Nurses Honor Guard of South Carolina, a non-profit dedicated to paying tribute to nurses by performing the Nightingale Tribute at funerals and memorial services. Now, the organization is looking to recruit new members to its Charleston division.

The service, similar to that of a military tribute, officially releases the nurse whose passed away from their nursing duties. Members of the honor guard attend all services wearing the traditional white uniform, cap and cape.

The ceremony itself is very brief, only allotting for

about five minutes of the total funeral service. Members recite the Nightingale Tribute and lay a white rose on the casket or next to the urn, symbolizing the nurse's dedication to

After the Nightingale Tribute is recited, a bell is rung after a roll call for the nurse. The nurse's name is called three times and the bell is rung after each call of the name. "Of course, she didn't answer," said Hucks. "But after the third ringing of the bell, they officially relieved my mom of her nursing duties. You could hear a pin drop."

A lit Nightingale lamp is carried up at the beginning of the ceremony and is then extinguished and presented to the family with personal condolences made. And according to Hucks, two nurses stood guard alongside her mothers casket, swapping out nurses every 15 minutes until the memorial services began.

Hucks and Cox have both worked in nursing for over 30 years,

they say would come home from work beaming with joy after caring for her patients at McLeod Loris Hospital in Loris, South Carolina.

When Hucks and Cox graduated nursing school, the two even worked at the same hospital as their mother, learning her tips on bedside manner.

The organization is a nationwide non-profit, but began in South Carolina in the summer of 2019 when registered nurse Stormy Shealy founded the Upstate chapter of the organization.

Shealy has worked as a registered nurse in the emergency department for Prisma Health for over 30 years. "When I

heard about nurses who honor other nurses at the time of their death, it spoke to my heart," said Shealy.

The organization is a nationwide non-profit, but began in South Carolina in the summer of 2019 when registered nurse Stormy Shealy founded the Upstate chapter of the organization. Shealy said she started the organization at a pizza parlor in Easley, where she and a few of her colleagues brainstormed how they could start a chapter of the Nurses Honor Guard in their home state.

Now, the organization has 138 members across four regional chapters, including the Upstate, Midlands, Pee Dee, and Lowcountry regions.

"I believe nurses need to be honored not only in life, but in death, as well," said Shealy. "Serving on the honor Two members of the Lowcountry chapter of Nurses Honor guard is even more fulfilling than my 32-year nursing career, and I love being a nurse."

"The nurses honor guard is a very special tribute to anybody in the nursing field," said Cox. "Nursing was my mom's calling and it became me and my sister's calling as well.

According to Shealy, nurses these days are under extreme physical and emotional stress, largely due to the overwhelming number of COVID-19 patients in emergency rooms and intensive care units.

Not only that, but some hospitals in the state have experienced staffing shortages in the midst of a surge in COVID-19 cases due to the omicron variant. While the state health agency continues to ask residents to get vaccinated and boosted to curb the spread of the virus, children and adults are still getting infected and hospitalized with COVID-19.

"We are literally on the front lines of this pandemic," said Shealy. "I think even more than ever, nurses should be honored and respected."

SC OFFICIALS CELEBRATE NEW LAW GIVING MILITARY PENSIONS A FULL BREAK FROM INCOME TAXES

Ed. Note: News of military pension tax break was first reported to me by member Sue Widhalm, who asked that the good news be shared! Below are excerpts from the story reported by Seanna Adcox in the Post and Courier

SUMTER — Military retirees will no longer pay any South Carolina income taxes on their pensions under a new law meant to attract and thank veterans while also keeping their skills in the Palmetto State. The law ceremoniously signed by Gov. Henry McMaster June 29 lets veterans keep all of their military pension payments, closing the loop six years after the Legislature partially exempted their retirement income.

"This is the day we thought would never come, but better late than never," Sen. Thomas McElveen said at the welcome center outside Shaw Air Force Base, which is part of his district and among the eight major military instillations operating in South Carolina. The Sumter Democrat called the law, which actually took effect with McMaster's signature May 13, "the most important piece of legislation I've worked on" over his decade in the Senate.

House Speaker Murrell Smith said the effort started in 2010, after a retiring Air Force pilot told the Sumter Republican he wanted to stay but "it costs me money to live in South Carolina" as opposed to other states that already exempted military pensions from taxes. "This is the way that we say 'thank you' to our veterans and to those who sacrifice to serve our country," said Smith, the chamber's newly elected speaker.

The partial victory that he and other sponsors pushed through in 2016 started a five-year phase-in of tax deductions of up to \$17,500 annually for veterans under 65 and up to \$30,000 for older veterans' pensions. The full exemption brings South Carolina in line with a list that's grown to 35 other states. Advocates said it was essential to keep the state competitive for veterans deciding where to settle their families after decades of moves.

South Carolina is home to nearly 400,000 veterans. About 64,000 of those are military retirees earning pensions after serving in the military at least 20 years, ranking the state eighth nationwide, according to the state Department of Veterans Affairs. The law does not exempt any income that veterans earn from jobs they take after retiring from the military.

An economic study showed the military contributes \$34 billion to South Carolina's economy, representing 11 percent of the total economy and supporting more than 250,000 jobs either directly or indirectly. The Charleston region, which includes Joint Base Charleston and the U.S. Coast Guard, still has the state's largest military presence, accounting for \$12.7 billion of the total economic impact. The tri-county area is home to 15,600 service members, 75,200 veterans, 15,500 retirees and 5,400 Department of Defense civilian contractors, according to the study commissioned by the state veterans' agency and prepared by University of South Carolina economist Joseph Von Nessen.

Ranking second is the Midlands, which includes Fort Jackson and McEntire Joint National Guard Base, with a \$6.6 billion economic impact, 18,000 service members, nearly 80,000 veterans, 16,500 retirees, and 3,400 civilian contractors, according to the study.

"This is just one wonderful thing to make a difference in South Carolina," he said of the pension exemption. "This was, is and always will be a great military state."

PHYLLIS MAE DAILEY: FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN NAVY NURSE

In celebration of Women's History Month, The National WWII Museum is focusing on milestones in women's contributions to the war effort. For black women in particular, the war was fought for "Double V" - victory over the enemy overseas, and victory over prejudice at home. In 1945, **Phyllis Mae**Dailey was inducted into the United States Navy Nurse Corps. Dailey (second from right in the photograph at right) was the first African American sworn in as a Navy nurse



on 8 March 1945, following changes in Navy recruitment and admittance procedures that had previously excluded black women from joining the Nurse Corps.

First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt was a well known proponent for the change, and had also put pressure on the Marine Corps Women's Reserve, WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service), and SPARS (the women's component of the Coast Guard) — all subsets of the Navy — to do the same. The SPARS would finally be integrated in October 1944, and the WAVES in December 1944. As a matter of reference, the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (later fully incorporated and called the Women's Army Corps) accepted African Americans beginning in January 1941, but capped the number who could serve to around 10% of the corps.

Under pressure from several directions, the Navy ended exclusion based on race in January 1945. Due to the Navy Nurse Corps being one of the last units to accept African Americans, it had the smallest representation of black women. By August 1945, when the war ended, there were just four active duty African American nurses in the Navy Nurse Corps, versus more than 6,000 that had served with the Women's Army Corps during the war. *This post by Curator Meg Roussel*



The theme for the observance of Women's History Month in 2022 was "Women providing healing, promoting hope". In a look back at military nursing history, members of the US **Army Nurse Corps** in 1944 are shown in between training exercises while they await deployment to the South Pacific

near the end of World War II. At the time, all who served in the Army Nurse Corps were women, and the units were all segregated. And though the need for nurses was urgent, the army had set a quota for just 160 Black nurses. By the end of the war, that number had increased to nearly 500.


