NAVAL MEDICAL LEADER AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT COMMAND (NMLPDC): WHAT WE CAN DO FOR YOU!

NMLPDC is located in the historic tower at NSA Bethesda. While the command is home to several directorates, the one of main interest to the Nurse Corps is the Officer Programs Directorate (OPD). OPD provides oversight of the Navy Medicine Graduate Medical Education (GME) and Graduate Professional Education (GPE) programs: manages commissioning programs for Navy and Marine Corps enlisted personnel, administers and manages continuing education (CE) approval for Navy Medicine, provides Non-Budget Submitting Office (Non-BSO) 18 training support, and board certification and maintenance.

Duty under instruction (DUINS) is one of the amazing benefits available to commissioned Nurse Corps officers. This program allows commissioned officers the opportunity to attend Graduate school programs (Military and Civilian) while on full-time active duty. Essentially, the Navy pays you to go to school and picks up the cost for tuition! Members submit completed packages to a review board consisting of senior officers where the packages are ranked and competitively selected for participation in the program. Of note, the most recent DUINS board included 75 training opportunities—this year we are expecting more, so now is the time to take advantage of this incredible opportunity to further your education! Anticipate the AY DUINS note to be published in May 26.

Additionally, NMLPDC has funding to support board certification and maintenance. This facilitates board certification and the advancement of our nursing force while compensating for the financial burden of board-required fees.

Finally, OPD contains the Accredited Approver Program for Continuing Medical Education (CME) and Continuing Nursing Education (CNE). The national professional association of RNs, the American Nurses Association (ANA), emphasizes the importance of professional development and lifelong learning. The Accredited Approver Program offers educational activities that enhance professional practice, enhance patient care, and the health of our beneficiaries. These activities also facilitate continuing education credits for certification and licensure maintenance. For FY25, OPD approved 568 activity applications, offering 13,120 credits/contact hours, with 12,127 registered participants.

The Navy Medicine Leadership & Professional Development Command (NMLPDC) offers a unique, funded opportunity for nurses to specialize in tropical medicine. This skill set is operationally vital for preventing and recognizing diseases in deployed forces and for supporting humanitarian missions.

Mission Overview

Participants will embark on a 2-3 week Military Tropical Medicine Field Mission, providing exposure to tropical diseases and conditions not typically encountered in a standard military treatment facility (MTF). During the mission, nurses will:

- Engage with local subject matter experts in various medical specialties.
- Collaborate with the host country's health departments and community liaisons.
- Gain a new perspective on public health structures and practices.

Key Benefits

Official Record	The course is added as a service school to your Officer Record upon completion.
Continuing Education	Earn 100 CEUs that can be applied toward most RN licenses and some certification renewals.
Funding	In the past, this field mission has been centrally funded by NMLPDC.

Who Should Apply?

While a strong interest in public or global health is helpful, nurses from all specialties are encouraged to apply. You do not need to be in an operational position to be considered.

Release of the FY26 Lineal List triggered some questions, in particular the use of one abbreviation. “AZ NPC” has made rare appearances over the last few decades, but this year the abbreviation made quite a showing. The abbreviation stands for Above Zone Not Previously Considered (AZ NPC) and its occurrence on the list was due to an increased number of reservists recalling to active duty. When a reservist’s request for permanent active duty is approved, they retain their reserve rank, date of rank, and selection status if selected (failures do not carry over). AZ NPC means a person has not been considered for promotion by an active duty promotion board, but has a date of rank/lineal number more senior to the In Zone population. AZ NPC may occur under other circumstances, such as a return to active duty from the Career Intermission Program. When members return to active duty for any reason, they must be on active duty for at least one year at the time the board convenes to be considered for promotion. All members are automatically deferred (not considered) unless they expressly request a waiver of deferment. Members listed as In Zone or Above Zone who have not served a full year on active duty at the time the board convenes are not considered for promotion unless they request the waiver of deferment. The waiver process and due dates for the request are detailed in the zone NAVADMIN. The NAVADMIN also contains board convening dates and due dates for Letters to the Board (LTB).

CNO IN THE SPOTLIGHT: NMRTC GREAT LAKES

Having grown up in Maine, I was excited to experience all four seasons when I arrived at NMRTC Great Lakes at the Captain James A. Lovell Federal Health Care Center in North Chicago. Learning how to scrape ice off my windshield and stand in formation during a blizzard provides some of the best resiliency-building exercises imaginable. While the command is widely recognized for providing care to recruits in boot camp at the Quarterdeck of the Navy, its strategic partnership as the nation's only fully integrated joint VA and DOD healthcare facility and its operational readiness missions are equally impressive at this historic institution.

As Chief Nursing Officer, I have the privilege of leading approximately 40 Nurse Corps officers who support multiple readiness and healthcare delivery missions. In addition to this role, I serve as the Deputy Associate Director for Patient Care Services within the facility's VA partnership, overseeing nursing, sterile processing, and chaplain services.

Our Expeditionary Resuscitative Surgical System (ERSS) teams operate at a high tempo at the prestigious Level I Trauma Center, John H. Stroger Hospital in Cook County, downtown Chicago. This rapidly deployable team provides immediate forward resuscitative surgery, prolonged field care, and en-route critical care, comprising of a surgeon, an anesthesia provider, an emergency room provider, two nurses, and two corpsmen. With the successful deployment and return of our first team, we look forward to continued achievements in deployment, training, sustainment, and collaboration with the Cook County staff.

At the nation's only Navy boot camp, our recruiting teams have exceeded their goals over the past year, bringing in an impressive number of recruits to prepare for the fleet. The medical team has risen to the challenge, with nurses spearheading policies to improve patient throughput, delivering safe and effective care, making critical catches in medically complex cases, and contributing to the recruits' remarkable 92% graduation rate.

In March 2024, the Captain James A. Lovell Federal Health Care Center implemented the Federal Electronic Health Record (FEHR). This initiative integrated components that had long been challenging to synchronize within the joint facility, making this EHR rollout the capstone for MHS GENESIS across the DOD and the sixth VA facility to adopt Oracle Health. Having been stationed at two prior commands during EHR launches, I had the honor of co-chairing the Informatics Steering Committee, helping to coordinate over 700 personnel who supported the rollout's success.

The beginning of 2024 also marked the launch of the Navy Nurse Residency Program at this command. For the first time, newly graduated and newly commissioned Navy nurses were assigned to the program, which **Lt. Cmdr. Maria Vitale-Echon** designed to align with the hospital's specialties, branch clinics, and partnerships with Cook County Hospital. **Lt. Cmdr. Brandi Wilson** has taken over the reins as her predecessor transferred, ensuring the successful graduation from the program of five nurses. We are excited about the next cohort's potential, bolstered by strong Nurse Corps recruiting efforts. Two residency graduates, **Ens. Alexandria Demeny** and **Ens. Keala Hallerberg**, were selected to attend the Pathway to Excellence conference in October as DOD representatives on the integrated VA/DOD team dedicated to achieving Pathway to Excellence designation. This ANCC program recognizes healthcare organizations that create positive practice environments that empower and engage staff.

We deeply value our partnership with Advocate Condell Medical Center, where **Lt. Conor Ford** earned his 1960 subspecialty code after gaining critical care experience and passing his certification exam last winter. Other nurses with this subspecialty code, as well as those pursuing it, benefit greatly from this unique and enriching experience.

The past 18 months have been incredibly rewarding. The Nurse Corps officers at this command continuously strive for excellence, meet challenges across diverse mission sets, and overcome barriers with professionalism and determination. As the Military Health System's landscape evolves, I am eager to face future opportunities and challenges with this extraordinary and dynamic team.

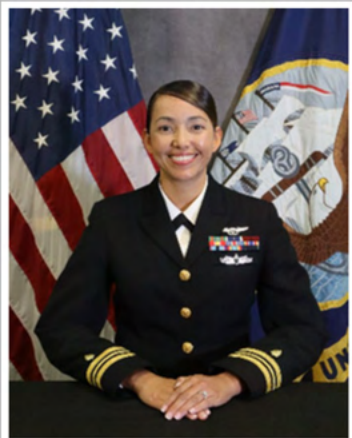

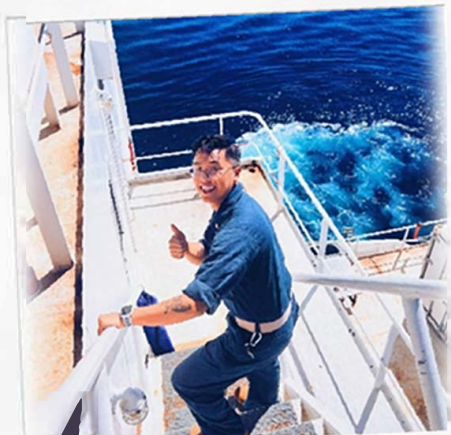

FROM THE FLEET: THREE DAY CRASH COURSE—PREPARING A FUTURE NAVY PSYCHIATRIC NURSE PRACTITIONER

When **Lt. Cristian Barnutz**, a Multi-Service Unit nurse stationed in Naples, Italy, reached out asking if he could shadow me for three days to prepare for his DUINS (Duty Under Instruction) application, I thought he was just exploring ideas. Then his itinerary hit my inbox—he was flying halfway across the world to spend 72 hours in my clinic. No pressure. He arrived, motivated and ready. We kicked off with introductions to the team—psychologists, social worker, and behavioral health techs, before diving into clinical cases. He observed **Lt. Cmdr. David Frey's** new psychiatric evaluations, follow-ups, and a range of diagnoses from ADHD and anxiety to bipolar spectrum disorders. We also tackled limited duty, medical boards, and fitness for duty—highlighting how Navy PMHNPs balance patient care with mission readiness.

Day two was again all clinical, packed with more complex cases and deep dives into treatment strategies. But it wasn't just about patients—it was about the leadership role PMHNPs play, managing care within the operational framework. Day three expanded his view beyond the clinic. We attended a stakeholder meeting with Marine Corps Community Services, covering

behavioral health programs and community concerns. He then joined a focused leadership meeting with the Installation Director of Psychological Health, the MAG—embedded psychiatrist, and the head of Behavioral Health at MCCS—seeing firsthand how we collaborate to support the force. He even caught a visit from **Vice Admiral Cheever** (Air Boss), witnessing high-level discussions on supporting warfighters in INDOPACOM. Preparing him for DUINS in just three days was no small task, but it underscored a truth we all know: In Navy Medicine, it's not about the time you have—it's about how you use it. Good luck, Cristian. See you in the fleet.

Lt. Barnutz on his shadowing experience:

*"During my foray to Iwakuni, which houses a beautiful new building, I had the experience of shadowing with **Lt. Cmdr. Frey** and the mental/behavioral health department. Not only gathering shadowing hours from a mental health nurse practitioner, but also through experiencing group therapy lead by **Lt. Jameson** (Clinical Psychologist). The wealth of experiences increased my understanding of psychiatry with the inclusion of responsibilities of leadership. On the last day of shadowing, I had the chance to sit in on a base-wide meeting and in attendance were all the different facets of mental/behavioral health. The therapists, the social workers, the chaplains and the list goes on with all in attendance numbering in the 30s. A joint effort to combat the mental health challenges of the OCONUS duty station. I had a chance to experience mental health not only from the Navy's perspective but that of the Marine Corps and civilian outlook; ultimately working together as one unit. Overseas commands face many challenges, yet the approach and communication demonstrated by Iwakuni was impressive."*

At U.S. Navy Medicine Readiness and Training Command (NMRTC) Guam, mentorship, professional development, and preparing our Sailors for future success are top priorities. Recently, the command hosted a “Nurse Corps Takeover” event as part of the February Sailor 360 program, aiming to provide enlisted Sailors interested in commissioning as Navy Nurse Corps (NC) officers with clear, comprehensive information about available pathways.

A detailed PowerPoint presentation outlined every enlisted-to-commissioned Nurse Corps program, including Medical Enlisted Commissioning Program (MECP), Seaman-to-Admiral-21 (STA-21), Nurse Candidate Program (NCP), and direct commissioning. Attendees received key resources, NAVADMIN guidance, points of contact, and critical deadlines to help them navigate their career options confidently. To provide additional support, the command career counselor was also present to address administrative and program-specific questions.

To enhance the learning experience, a panel of 15 prior enlisted Sailors who had commissioned as Nurse Corps officers (also referred to as Mustangs) through different pathways shared their personal journeys, lessons learned, and current roles in Navy Medicine. Following the presentations, an interactive question and answer session allowed Sailors to engage directly with the panel and gain valuable mentorship and insight. The event was well received, with **Master Chief Matthew Fetterolf** describing it as “informational and inspirational”, reinforcing the importance of exposing corpsmen to the many career advancement opportunities available. This Sailor 360 initiative reflects U. S. NMRTC Guam’s commitment to developing future Navy Nurses, ensuring our enlisted personnel are well-informed, supported, and prepared for success. By integrating mentorship, education, and career development, we continue to strengthen the future of Navy Medicine—one Sailor at a time.

READINESS IN ACTION

FROM THE FLEET: DEFENSE HEALTH AGENCY FORENSIC HEALTHCARE LEAD VISITS NMRTC GUAM

The Forensic Healthcare Program (FHP) at U.S. Navy Medicine Readiness and Training Command (NMRTC) Guam kicked off 2025 by hosting the Defense Health Agency's (DHA) Defense Health Network Indo-Pacific (DHN-IP) Forensic Healthcare lead, **Allyson Cordoni**, for a week of simulations and training. The program's current manager, **Cmdr. Mary King**, coordinated a four-day visit in January that included an in-depth program overview with incoming program manager, **Lt. Cmdr. Heather Nelson**, as well as comprehensive sexual assault medical forensic exams (SAFEs), peer review feedback of DD Form 2911s, case reviews, and four lecture topics that yielded 37 continuing education units (CEUs).

In a remote OCONUS location with approximately 13-15 SAFEs annually, Ms. Cordoni bridged training gaps for forensic healthcare examiners (FHEs), enabling previously trained FHEs to renew their competency requirements and validate FHE competencies in accordance with DHA credentialing requirements. As DHA inspections expand to include sexual assault response components, Ms. Cordoni's visit provided invaluable insight towards ensuring patient care services and compliance with policy requirements.

Those interested in expanding deployment readiness and supporting the FHP mission globally, should consider joining the team. To become a FHEs/Sexual Assault Medical Forensic Examiner (SAMFE) candidates must:

1. Be licensed as a physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, nurse midwife, certified registered nurse anesthetist, clinical nurse specialist, or registered nurse.
2. Complete entry level training by one of the following:
 - a. SAMFE Course, located at Joint Base San Antonio-Fort Sam Houston, Texas, and demonstrated competency within six months or equivalent DHA training within the DoD, within the past year.
 - b. Certified with the Commission for Forensic Nursing Certification or other national certification body (e.g., SANE-A®) and complete the SAMFE Course within 12 months of appointment.
 - c. The FY16 BUMED Mobile Training Team and the USAMEDCOM Headquarters SAMFE Course
3. Maintain credentialing and competency annually as by:
 - a. Completing four sexual assault continuing education units.
 - b. Demonstrating clinical competence through retrospective medical record review, live proctoring, completion of four SAFEs (either simulated or actual) validated by a supervisor.

FROM THE FLEET: NMRTC GUAM NURSE SELECTED AS FIRST SHIP'S NURSE FOR USS SOMERSET

Agana Heights, Guam (February 2026): Lt. Nakpane Nbohn, a medical-surgical nurse assigned to NMRTC Guam has been selected as the first-ever Ship's Nurse aboard the amphibious warfare ship USS Somerset (LPD 25)/Released

Lt. Nakpane Nbohn, a medical-surgical nurse assigned to U.S. Naval Medical Readiness and Training Command Guam and U.S. Naval Hospital Guam, has been selected to serve as the first-ever nurse aboard the amphibious warfare ship USS Somerset (LPD 25).

With 11 years of service as a Navy Nurse Corps officer, Lt. Nbohn will serve as the sole medical-surgical nurse aboard the San Diego-based vessel, establishing the foundation for the newly created billet and setting the standard for future nurses assigned to the platform.

"This was a long-term goal," Nbohn said. "When the opportunity aligned with my career aspirations, I seized it without hesitation."

Although this will be his first dedicated operational assignment, Nbohn gained shipboard experience during two deployments aboard USNS Mercy (T-AH 19) supporting Pacific Partnership missions. In Guam, he currently serves in a high-acuity environment where he has refined his clinical and leadership skills as a charge nurse and nurse officer of the day.

Certified as a medical-surgical registered nurse, Nbohn also holds credentials in hematology/oncology, advanced life support, pediatric advanced life support, trauma nursing core course, and health education.

As the inaugural ship's nurse, he anticipates defining the scope of practice for medical-surgical nurses aboard an amphibious warfare ship while strengthening medical readiness for Sailors and embarked Marines. *"Being selected is a tremendous honor," he said. "I understand the responsibility that comes with being a pioneer, and I am committed to building a strong foundation for those who follow."* His assignment reflects the Navy's expanding integration of nursing leadership into operational environments and underscores the growing role of nurses in supporting fleet readiness.

"This selection demonstrates that excellence in medical-surgical nursing translates directly to operational readiness," stated **Cmdr. William Westbrook**, Director of Nursing at USNH Guam. *"Our medical-surgical nurses manage complexity, think critically, and lead in dynamic environments every day - skills that are essential in the operational setting. This milestone reinforces our commitment to developing agile, mission-ready nurses who are prepared to serve wherever the Navy calls."*

For junior nurses seeking operational billets, Nbohn offers simple advice: *"Seek mentorship and prepare yourself. Success is achieved when preparation meets opportunity."*

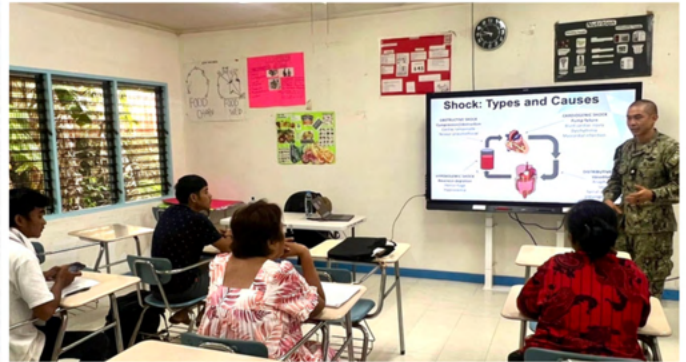
